Energy crisis and ALV

As indicated in the previous newsletter, the next ALV will be held early next year due to the evervarying energy prices. The board of the VvE has now received the new variable prices for joint gas and electricity. These new prices for m3 gas (factor x3.7) and kWh (factor x4.6) are considerably higher. This will have a considerable impact on the financial management of the association. We are therefore working together with VZB to provide insight into the consequences of this and to adjust the multi-year maintenance plan (MJOP) and the budget accordingly.



There is no doubt that financially difficult times await the association and that without increasing the monthly contribution and without support from the government, a financial doomsday scenario is not unthinkable.

Stand pipe renovation

On December 6, the company VSR started with the renovation of the stacks in the 8-high section. With the publication of this newsletter, these 8 kitchen standpipes have been fitted with a reliner and are in use again. It has also become abundantly clear that horizontal downpipes pose the greatest risk of clogging. There has been an accumulation of dried fat in it, causing the horizontal pipes to silt up. That is why it has been decided to have these pipes thoroughly cleaned. If residents continue to flush everything down the kitchen drain, the problem of blockages will reoccur within the foreseeable future after relining the downpipes and they will have to be cleaned again. This also means extra costs for the association (i.e. all owners).

We understand that you don't always feel like it, but a paper towel is a good way to remove grease and gravy from a pan before washing it off. It can save you a lot of work afterwards. Because accumulated grease is the number 1 enemy of your drain.
